High-Tech Security Features

On our original SSIP the Section 2.B "High Tech Security - Communications Component Phone Upgrade" was initially submitted in 2018. Since that time, the equipment initially proposed has been replaced with newer models as well having a significant decrease in costs. We are submitting this amendment to reflect the equipment changes as well as the change in budgetary amounts. In reviewing the original proposal the need to ensure all areas have phone service including those which only have wireless capability were not being met. The newer models on this amended form all have this capability ensuring adequate telco service throughout the school district. The existing proposal also did not resolve the need to ensure the district has one common phone system. By amending this order all phone components in every building will now be under one common system.
