


So Long, Shopping Mall

Shopping malls have been around for the past 50 years. But lately, malls have started to disappear. Some are closing their doors for good. Others are trying to keep their customers.

The first shopping mall opened in 1956. Since then, more than 1,500 others have been built. Large parking lots let crowds park at malls. Big stores like Sears, Macy's, and JC Penney draw shoppers in. Inside, smaller stores sell everything from clothes to kittens. Kiosks sell glasses, hot pretzels, and other items. The food court offers fast, cheap food. Santa Claus and the Easter Bunny even show up for pictures.

Shopping malls attracted different people and provided something for everyone. Shoppers flocked to stores to find good deals. Others came just to browse. Hundreds of employees worked at a mall. They worked in retail, maintenance, or security. Retirees walked the halls for exercise when the weather outside was poor. Teenagers hung out in the food court. Couples attended movies.

Employees, shoppers, and others are in for a change. Interest in malls started to drop in the mid-2000s. First, foot traffic began to drop. Then stores started to close. Then entire malls began to close. These changes had a lot to do with technology.

Today, shoppers can buy anything they need online. It's faster and easier than going to a mall. Businesses that sell online don't have to rent store space or hire cashiers. They save money compared to stores in a mall, so their prices can be lower.

Some say that one out of every four malls will be closed by 2022. That's why some malls are trying new ways to attract business. They've added better restaurants, bowling alleys, and ropes courses. Some have rented out upper floors as office space or apartments. Perhaps a mall near you has tried these types of changes. Head to your local mall to check and see (before it's too late).




