Hempstead Public Schools Overview

Hempstead is a village in the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York. Hempstead is one of the oldest communities on Long Island and has been an incorporated village since 1853.

The Hempstead School District was created in 1863 with a special charter from the New York State Legislature. The first Hempstead High School commencement exercise was held in 1863. Presently, the Hempstead School District serves a multicultural student population. Approximately 6,500 students attend Hempstead Public Schools in grades kindergarten through 12.

Hempstead High School serves approximately 1,900 students in grades 9-12. The curriculum has over 285 courses including Regents, Honors, Smart Scholars Early College program, and twenty-two Advanced Placement classes. Hempstead High School has received special recognition from the College Board for Advanced Placement courses. Since 2014, Hempstead High School graduates have earned more than \$10 million dollars in academic and athletic scholarships.

The High School campus is composed of three buildings that feature specialized classrooms, as well as an 1,850-seat auditorium, a large gymnasium, an Olympic size pool, a music suite, a Little Theatre, and a Media Center containing over 30,000 volumes as well as current updates in technology and equipment.

Alverta B. Gray Schultz Middle School is a certified International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme for grades 7 and 8. ABGS Middle School emphasizes the development of the whole child ensuring students are healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged to meet their individual goals. All grade 8 students are advanced for New York State Regent courses in Algebra 1 and Living Environment. At Alverta B. Gray Schultz Social-Emotional Learning systems are based in restorative practices including a student calming center, trained peer mediation, restorative circles, after school enrichment programs, mentoring, and Boys Scouts of America troop 280.

As a New York State Community School, Alverta B. Gray Schultz Middle School prioritizes family engagement and strong community partnerships. The ABGS Marketplace, in partnership with Island Harvest Food Bank, supports members of the Hempstead community experiencing food insecurity. In partnership with the Gordon F. Derner School of Psychology at Adelphi University, the Derner Hempstead Child Clinic specializes in providing high-quality, low-cost services to children, adolescents, and families. The 21st Century Parent & Student Resource Centers offer programs designed to improve student learning outcomes; foster positive youth and family development; support both school and community engagement and address social emotional wellness.

Hempstead Union Free School District elementary centers are designed to provide a comprehensive education in a nurturing and stimulating environments. All Pre-K-elementary schools within the Hempstead Public School systems are certified International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (IB PYP) schools. Thus, ensuring learning communities focused on academic excellence, 21st century skills development, creativity, and the training of future community leaders. The elementary centers boast high quality after school enrichment programs designed to support the physical, intellectual, and civic development of all students. Rhodes Academy for the Humanities and the Arts is housed in a new state of the art building indicative of Hempstead UFSD commitment to the future. With over \$80 million dollars in approved bond referendums for capital projects, Hempstead Union Free School District is committed to providing premier environments and experiences for Hempstead students for decades to come.

A Day in the Life of a Student at David Paterson Elementary


