HEMPSTEAD HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS BASKETBALL

The 1923-1924 season was the most successful to date in girls basketball at Hempstead High School. The girls were undefeated during the regular season. A post season game was arranged with Lenox Road Church of Brooklyn for the Amateur Boys rules championship of the United States. Hempstead won 39-11. Later, a three-game series was played with Croton High School for the girls rules championship of New York State. Croton won at Hempstead (19-18), lost at home (28-26), then won the deciding game against Hempstead at Mt. Vernon (23-15). Hempstead High School's captain--and best known player--was Mary Washburn. Mary Washburn was a silver medalist in the 440 yard relay in the 1928 Olympics.

The 1924-1925 girls basketball season was even more outstanding. The ladies won the Nassau County championship, outscoring their opponents 753-287. They then went on to win the National Basketball Championship of the United States on April 3, 4 and 6, 1925 (hosted by Hempstead)! Guthrie, Oklahoma--the defending champions--lost to Struthers, Ohio, 24-18, on Friday evening to represent the west. Hempstead beat Burlington, Vermont, 49-14, on Saturday evening to win the east. On Monday evening, Hempstead edged Struthers 25-22 to win the Westfield Cup (valued at \$800) as the national champions. Dot Oatis--who scored 19 points against Burlington--broke a 22-22 tie in last quarter. Else Klein raised score to 25-22 a few seconds before end of the game. Else Klein--described as "a marvel in shooting, a girl with an unlimited knowledge of every phase of the game"--was team captain. Legendary Joe Fay was girls basketball coach (also coached football and baseball at Hempstead High School with great success); coaching career spanned three decades.

The only equal to 1920's for Hempstead High School came a lifetime later. Coach Ollie Mills--led Hempstead to boys county title in 1973 in front of a record 9300 fans at Nassau Coliseum--led Hempstead High School to Nassau County girls titles in 1980, 1981, 1982 and 1983. Hempstead won the New York State public and New York State Federation titles in 1982. In that era, girls once boasted 52 straight wins overall and 71 straight wins at home. Lisa Smith (nonpareil)--later, All-Big East at St. John's--scored a school mark of 2418 career points, including 936 points in 1982-1983 season. Lisa Smith led team to a 92-3 record during her four years as a starter. Lisa Smith once tallied 50 points in a game (though short of school record of 60 points by the great Jennifer Mitchell in 1972). Lisa Smith is joined in school's 1000 point club by teammates Sharon Hampton (1152) and Loretta Jordan (1035); their names displayed on a banner in high school gym. Lisa's jersey also hangs on the wall (only girl to have number retired). Impressively, Lisa Smith voted female athlete of the century at Hempstead High School (Joe Blocker is male equivalent). Proudly, Hempstead High School basketball court is dedicated in the memory of Ollie Mills, first person of color to teach/coach at Hempstead High School (1957).
